Beers new to the exhibition this year include Wild Boar Bitter from Yorkshire's Trough Brewery (!), Sussex County Ale, Jacobs Best Bitter from the Nailsea Brewery, Hermitage Best Bitter and a number of others, plus of course, many old favourites including a large consignment of Timothy Taylors!

Whilst the beers at the exhibition are not over-expensive (from 54p a pint), remember to take plenty of money with you to spend on the CAMRA stand, which will be selling a range of county real ale guides, T-shirts, badges, CAMRA ties, Good Beer Guides, etc, mostly at special low prices. Help branch and CAMRA's national funds by also purchasing some pontoon tickets (prizes of up to £20) and, for your collection, some of the unusual beermats and breweriana which will be on sale.





# **GALES FOR ALDERSHOT**

Good news for drinkers in the Aldershot area is that Gale's beers, after an absence of more than a year, are to return to the town. Since the lease expired on the Unicorn, which was then taken back by Courages (and suffered the indignity of having its handpumps removed) Gales have been searching for another outlet in the area. Their chance came when Watneys decided to dispose of the Albion in Waterloo Road, just a couple of hundred yards from the Royal Staff, a well known Good Beer Guide pub.

At the time of writing, Gales are working hard to renovate the pub, which had become rather run-down, and hope to re-open soon. Once the reopening date is known, we hope to organise a CAMRA meeting at the Albion. Check the back page of this newsletter for any "stop press" giving further news.

#### PUBS FOR SALE

We have heard reports that both the Volunteer in Aldershot High Street, and the Mount Pleasant, off Redan Hill, Aldershot are for sale with licence. Any further news would be appreciated.

#### GODALMING'S FREE HOUSE

A free house opened quietly in Godalming at the end of last year. It is the Anchor, which is currently selling Wethered S.P.A. and bitter, Draught Bass and Courage Directors Bitter. A CAMRA meeting has been arranged at the Anchor for Wednesday, May 19th.

#### WATNEYS VARIETY

Following the introduction of Ushers Best Bitter at the Crown & Cushion, Minley, this beer is now also available at the Six Bells, Hale Road, Farnham, where it is served alongside Tamplins from traditional beer engines. Watneys obviously intend to make their regional beers more widely available, as the Ushers is now served from the strange converted kegs used normally in this area for Tamplins and Stag bitters. At least one Watney/Grand Met pub in the Middlesex area is now selling Websters and Manns draught beers along -side the more usual Watney offerings, so keep your eyes open, and let "News of the Booze" know of any further variety offered by Watney pubs in this

#### ANOTHER FREE HOUSE

The Passfield Oak, near Whitehill, is now a free house, having been sold by Friary Meux, with licence - a happier situation than the White Lion in Haslemere, a Good Beer Guide pub closed by Friary in March, and now for sale delicensed. The Passfield Oak, at the time of writing, is being "renovated", and is serving Ballard's Wassail (at 80p a pint) and Marston's Pedigree.

#### LIONS' SHARE

Most local members realise that the Farnham Beerex is organised jointly by The Farnham Lions Club, The Farnham Maltings Association and ourselves, but how many realise just how much good they are doing by enjoying the Exhibition?

The fact is that about  $\frac{3}{4}$  of the profit from the Beerex goes to charities (mainly local ones) via the Lions Club. In recent years some examples of Lions' donations have been £6,000 for a heart monitoring machine and £500 towards a baby scanner at the Frimley Park Hospital, and £1,250 to the Bells Piece Cheshire Home for the mentally handicapped, in Farnham.

So, as you enjoy trying the different beers at Farnham Beerex, please don't begrudge the admission fee - it goes to a very worthwhile cause.

#### 'PUNCH' PEEPS INTO THE PUBS

IN this week's episode of the "United saga," one man links two pubs which stand only a five-minute walk apart.

That man is 78-year-old Frank "Punch" Parratt, who lives close to the Bat and Ball in Upper Bourne Lane, Farnham, and has been a regular commuter to the Sandrock in Sandrock Hill Road as well during his many years as customer and connoisseur of beer.

Frank's wealth of memories, generally delivered with a dry chuckle, go back to his first drink in "The Bat" in 1917, when the pub was run by Arthur Fisher—the period during which our photograph was taken.

#### Horse-drawn beer

Verbal notes passed back and forth from Frank to another "Bat" regular, Reg Farr, reveal that the beer used to be hauled along the stream from Sandrock Hill by means of horses, which walked through the water itself rather than by the more normal barge process where the horse remained on the bank.

The varieties of beer available at the time included mild, bitter and stout drawn straight from the barrel

("from the wood").

Frank's connection with the pub is deeper than that of a purely academic drinker, however, because his grandfather, Esau Parratt, was its licensee in 1865. Purely by coincidence, Esau's twin brother Jonathan was licensee of the Royal Oak, Wrecclesham, at the same time.

This is another Farnham United Breweries pub which will shortly be appearing in "Peeps".

#### Tally-man

Harry Mosey, the current licensee of the pub, points to its origins as a tally man's office in the centre of a hop field. Payment for hops picked was eventually augmented by a supply of beer and the pub began an illustrious business life which the return to real ale in the 1970s did nothing to inhibit.

Like the "Bat," the Sandrock is now a haven for "real ale" drinkers and, like the "Bat," its connection with local Parratts and sporting events goes back to the days when it was an annual Boxing Day event to stage a Sandrock "Parratts versus the rest" darts match.

#### Cricket connection


Andy Bujok, the pub's licensee, helped in closing the gap between the two pubs even further when he and a team drawn from regulars challenged the Bat and Ball to a cricket match, which was played off in August 1981, with the proceeds going to charity.

#### Gentlemen and ruffians

So prestigious was this match between "Eleven gentlemen of the Bat and Ball and eleven ruffians of the Sandrock" (so the posters proclaimed) that John Ebdon, formerly a resident of Rowledge and now a well-known broadcaster and lover of cricketing England, included the match in his Radio 4 series, "Ebdon's England".

At one point during the match, just after someone had put a "six" through the pavilion window, Punch was heard to remark in his rich rural brogue: "I remember 'ol "Bandy" Crow did that in 1923 —

rang the church bell. 'e did."



# Traditional Cider

Following the revival of interest in traditional British beer, the decline of our other traditional drink, cider, has been reversed. Last year, in fact, our first local cider manufacturer for many years began trading - the Hampshire Cider Company's "Selborne Gold" can be sampled at the Sandrock, near Farnham. A much bigger supplier is, of course, Bulmers, infamous for their keg Woodpecker and Strongbow. Bulmers seem to have seen the light now, though, for they supply traditional cider to a large number of pubs in this area, as you can see from the list of known outlets in the Surrey/Hants Borders CAMRA branch area:

#### ABBREVIATIONS USED IN THE LIST:

# Con. Bulmers Conditioned Cider. Conditioning is acheived from a secondary fermentation in the cask. An unfiltered cider with alcoholic content of 4.25% (increasing by 0.25% during secondary fermentation).

# W.C. Bulmers West Country Cider. Inherited by Bulmers from the Gloucester Cider Co, this cider has an alcoholic content of 5.4%.

# Still. Bulmers Still Cider. Whilst Conditioned Cider is available in sweet/medium/dry varieties, and West Country is available in medium/dry/extra dry varieties, still cider is free of added sugar or yeast and is therefore available in only a medium - sweet variety with an alcoholic content of 4.75%.

#### **Book Review**

"MINE'S A PINT - WHAT'S YOURS?" by Bill Tidy.

Well known for his strip cartoons, including the Fosdyke Saga in the Daily Mirror, and Kegbuster in the CAMRA newspaper, What's Brewing, Bill's Farnham Beer Exhibition programme covers have made the programme a collectors' item in recent years.

Mine's a Pint - What's Yours? is a collection of the best of the Kegbuster cartoons, made available to the general public for the first time, having been enjoyed by CAMRA members for some years now. The presentation of the book has divided the cartoons by subject rather than showing them in chronological order - this does not appear to have any advantage, but has, in my opinion, the disadvantage of showing Bill's recent, more stylised cartoons sitting almost uncomfortably alongside earlier, more detailed work such as can be seen on page 19 of the book. This presentation is probably also the cause of the duplication of one strip. It has been said that 'Kegbuster' is an acquired taste, but it is one that is easy to acquire, particularly if you appreciate some of the inventive pub names which crop up in some of the cartoon strips, such as the 'Boil & Poultice' and the 'Barmaid's Buttock'.

In view of the size of the area covered by our branch it has not proved possible for Steve to drink in every pub in the area (although he does his best) and he is therefore relying on as much help as possible from the branch members especially when the time comes to complete the survey forms. So please let Steve have as much news as possible.
