# SIGN the PETITION for **FLEXIBLE OPENING HOURS**

Flexible opening hours for public houses is the subject of a major new CAMRA campaign. The debate has resulted in the agreement of CAMRA, the NULV, the NALHM, the English Tourist Board and other fringe organisations that our outdated laws require change, not only for the sake of the customer, but in order that pubs can compete more successfully with clubs, off -licences and supermarkets. Unfortunately, this agreement has not extended to Parliament who, despite the favourable but shelved Erroll Commission Report, have thrown out the Clarke and Bonsor Private Member's Bills for licensing reform. In Scotland the Clayson Committee made similar recommendations to those of Erroll, but these were implemented in 1976, with the result that drinking in Scotland is now a civilized pleasure. CAMRA's aim is to collect a million signatures in favour of a more flexible approach (the campaign is not for longer hours - most publicans work very hard as it is - but for pubs to be allowed to open more in line with

public demand). Petition forms will be in as many pubs as possible, but readers of this newsletter are asked to help by

taking a petition form to their "locals", and to as many other pubs as possible. A copy of the form is enclosed with this

newsletter, and further copies can be obtained from the Branch Secretary (address on p7). If someone has already supplied a form to your local, and you really can't force yourself into any other pub, it should be easy to fill your form at your place of work. As your forms become filled, please forward them to the secretary, who will send replace—ments (postage will be refunded if requested). The petition will be presented to the Home Office in the spring, and is the major plank of CAMRA's "Flexibility Campaign". Home Office Minister Timothy Raison recently declared that the Government wanted to know the strength of feeling in favour of change—and the CAMRA Pub—goers Petition is designed to show this.

PLEASE GIVE THIS CAMPAIGN AS MUCH SUPPORT AS YOU CAN - IT IS SURELY HIGH TIME THAT EMERGENCY LAWS INTRODUCED DURING THE FIRST WORLD WAR WERE CONSIGNED TO THE HISTORY BOOKS.

# Gales lose the Anchor & Duke

Courage's Tenanted Sales Director, Mr. R. J. Burrells, has confirmed that at the end of their current leases both the Anchor at Normandy and the Duke of Cambridge at Tilford are to revert to Courage tenancies, having been leased to Gale & Co. Ltd. for several years. Courages would not give a more definite date for the changeovers than "sometime in 1983", but regulars at the Anchor say that the pub is to be handed

back during January. Although
the larger range of Gales beers
provides the real ale drinker
with more choice, all is not
gloom, for Mr. Burrells confirms
that "in both instances the
Courage cask-conditioned beers
Directors Bitter and Best Bitter
will be made available and it is
proposed that the new licensees
will stock these lines".

The Branch have written to Gales in the hope that they can give dates of changeover, but a reply had not been received at the time of going to press. Gales have also been asked if they are looking for replacement houses in the area. Whilst their beers are now available in free trade outlets, it is not just the beer itself which is an attraction, but the realistic prices in Gales tied houses which make the replacement of the Anchor and Duke important to local drinkers - a rare example of the brewery tie work -ing to the customers' advantage.

## HEN & CHICKEN TAKEN OVER

The Hen and Chicken on the A31 at Froyle has recently been sold, but is still reported to be selling a wide range of well-kept beers. The current line-up consists of handpumped Brakspear Special Bitter, Hall & Woodhouse Tanglefoot and Badger Best Bitter, Gales H.S.B. and Whitbread Strong Country Bitter.

## FARNHAM PUBS TO BE ALTERED


The Marlborough Head, East Street, Farnham is currently closed for alterations probably gaining real ale and losing the public bar.

# OFF LICENCE CLOSES

Decanters, the Farnham Real Ale off - licence has unfortunately closed down. Decanters had been selling Bourne Valley beers at just 50p a pint.

# A Pub with a Pedigree

Few pubs can have been owned by so many breweries during this century as the Woolpack in Godalming High Street. Apparently the Woolpack was once a William Smith of Bramley house. Smiths Brewery was taken over in August 1901 by Bruford & Co. Ltd. of Cranleigh - the Woolpack was one of eight pubs included in the deal. Bruford & Co, itself formed in 1888 by the merger of Bruford's and Bamford's businesses, was taken over in 1912 by Savill & Co. Ltd, who were brewing at the former Webb and Sons brewery in Shalford. Just a year later Savills merged with Ashby's Cobham Brewery Co. Ltd. to form Cobham United Brweries Ltd. The final episode of this saga took place in December 1922 when Cobham United were taken over by Watney, Combe, Reid & Co. Ltd. The Woolpack had seen a sizeable chunk of Surrey brewing history pass by in a period of little more than 21 years.

# ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 1982

A Brief Summary of the Surrey/Hants Borders Branch A.G.M., held on Thursday 18th November at Woking Railway Athletic Club.

Approximately 35 members were present. No progress had been made regarding the 1981 resolution to take steps toward holding the national CAMRA A.G.M. in our area. It was agreed to drop the proposal due to a lack of active members.

Reports: Nick Spindler (treasurer) circulated the balance sheet for 1981-2. The accounts were accepted subject to audit. Mike Andrew (Chairman) noted a continuing decline in attendance at meetings, and the cancellation of two excursions due to lack of support from members. He thanked the committee of the Railway Club for their hospitality both on the evening of the A.G.M. and on previous occasions. Alan Davies (Secretary) felt that there had been a lack of campaigning, and that the branch should be prepared to undertake a lot of work in distributing and collecting Flexible Hours Petition forms. Someone was required to co-ordinate this.

Election of Committee: This was to consist of seven members, according to branch constitution, but additional members could be co-opted for particular tasks. M. Andrew declined to stand for re-election as chairman: The following committee was elected on a block vote (nominated: A. Mason; seconded: D. Brittain), there being no other candidates: Chairman-Colin Severn; Secretary- Alan Davies; Treasurer- Nick Spindler; Membership secretary- koland Edwards; Sub-branch reps (Alton)-Steve Cook; (Guidford/Woking)- Martin Cave; (Blackwater Valley)-Dave Jones.

Election of Auditors: R. Henbest & P. Wallace
Election of Surrey Liason rep: M. Andrew
Clubs reps: It was agreed that Club liason reps should be appointed. Ray Henbest and John Lucas volunteered.

Motion: A motion calling for branch production of a West Surrey real ale guide, should further delay in a county guide become apparent, was passed.

Preston Pot: Mike Andrew presented the Cyril Preston Pot to Ray Henbest to hold during 1982-3 for his work in converting the Railway Club to real ale (the club now boasts 3 handpumps).
