GALES FORECAST THROUGHOUT THE SOUTH

Following the success of Ruddles County bitter in Watney pubs in the London area, Phoenix Brewery, the newly renamed southern arm of Watneys, have come to an agreement with George Gale & Co Ltd by which they will supply Gales H.S.B. to any of their pubs where there is a demand for it. Phoenix currently distribute Tamplins bitter (brewed for the south by Norwich Brewery), Stag bitter from London and Ushers Best Bitter from Trowbridge. Gale's HSB will provide their public houses with a strong ale which already has a good (some would say legendary) reputation.

HSB has already been on sale in a very few Phoenix pubs during the past year, in return for which Phoenix have been supplying some Gale's pubs with Carlsberg lager. John Cornish, CAMRA's Liason Officer with Gale's, expects more Gale's pubs to take lager in exchange for the HSB; rumours that Watney's parent company, Grand Metropolitan, had bought a substantial shareholding in Gale's were "completely untrue", he said.

Some landlords of Gale's pubs are unhappy about the new trading agreement, as they say that the sale of Gales beer in other nearby pubs will provide them with unfair

competition. They would like to have seen safeguards written into the agreement, such as Phoenix pubs next door to Gales houses being denied supplies of HSB.

The general feeling though, is that there is little threat to Gales landlords, who will be able to stock the entire range of Gales ales at probably a considerably lower price than Phoenix pubs. Although the price of HSB is likely to be very high (Ruddles County sells for at least 92p a pint in Watney's pubs) it is to be hoped that real ale will gain many more converts through this arrange -ment, which also proves once again that there is always room for improvement in the availability of good real ale, even in the south! Non-members of CAMRA please take note that the more members we can gain, the more readily available your favourite beers will become...(there's a membership application form on the back page!).

FARNHAM BEER EXHIBITION

The Beerex, which is organised by Farnham Lions, CAMRA and the Maltings Association will once again have over seventy real ales, plus traditional ciders, food and entertain -ment. New beers this year should include rarities such as Philips' Royal Love Potion or Aelrics Saxon Ale, the dark delights of Black Hog and dozens of other beers difficult or impossible to find around here. Tickets cost £1.75 and include as usual a souvenir glass.

New Gibbs' Beer at Festival

Ambitious, maybe, but not over-so, for the weekend long festival was very well organised, with all the beers in tip -top condition (at least, those that I tried - I was not going to try ALL of them in the short time I was there!).

I was already enyoying a glass of the new Gibbs' beer, Wiltshire Bitter, when a couple of friendly Gibbs representatives introduced themselves and suggested that they should buy a glass of the new beer for me to try. I explained that I was already drinking it, but accepted another anyway; the second glass seemed to taste even better than the first! Anyway, suffice

THE "GOOD LIFE" AT THE PIG & WHISTLE

The Pig & Whistle can be found just south of Alton (a little outside our branch area, in fact) on the A32, and is well worth a visit for its excellent home-brewed beers. Home made beer is just the beginning, however, for pub-produced cider is next on the cards, followed by the Pig & Whistle's own wine, and the establishment of a work-ing farm on land at the rear of the pub-virtual self-sufficiency! By the way, if you're not just there for the beer, you will find the food at the bar or in the separate restaurant pretty good, too.

The new mild is provisionally scheduled for release during the summer.

Supplement to News of the Booze no. 20.

Since edition 20 went to press, details of the Camping Weekend have been finalised, and a number of items of late news have come to hand which will be of interest to members, so here they are!

HOP BLOSSOM LICENCE LOST

The Hop Blossom, in Long Garden Walk, Farnham (a former Good Beer Guide entry), is likely to close down following the loss (subject to appeal) of Landlord Tony Brown's licence. Twenty-three local residents objected to the renewal of his licence at a hearing which lasted more than four hours. The main objections were on grounds of the noise made by customers who stood outside the pub drinking, and a number of occurences of customers vomiting and urinating in the street and in neighbours gardens. Other complaints were of glasses being thrown in the street, and allegations that some customers of the pub had urinated through the letterboxes of houses in the street.

After a spell of closure, the former Courage pub had reopened as a Victorian-style free house in 1978. At that time the wide range of beers were well looked after and the Hop Blossom quickly found itself in the G.B.G. In recent years, however, there have been a number of complaints of bad beer, and the pub is no longer to be found in the guide. In former years we have had some most enjoyable meetings at the Hop Blossom, and thanks are due to Tony Brown for continuing to support such aspects of CAMRA as the flexible hours petition, despite the pubs deletion from the G.B.G. It is a great shame that after such an encouraging reopening $4\frac{1}{2}$ years ago, the pub should have declined to the extent that it now seems likely to close its doors forever.

As for the future of the building, there is still a chance that it could regain a licence in the future, but only if a new owner could satisfy the licencing justices that the more unpleasant minority of the pub's present customers could be eliminated. The pub's neighbours would also need to be convinced that the nuisance could be removed, or they shall surely object to it ever reopening - and they will now need a lot of convincing.

SUMMER HOURS TO CONTINUE IN FARNHAM

Licensing justices have approved an application for weekday hours to be extended until llpm from May 1st to August 31st again this year in the Farnham area.

MARINERS REOPENS

The Mariners, on the A287 at Millbridge, Frensham, has reopened after a change of ownership. At the end of March the beers available there were Courage Best and Directors, and Webster's Yorkshire Bitter, all on handpump, and Ballard's Best, together with Brakspear Special Bitter straight from the cask. Three of these were sampled, and all were in excellent form. The atmosphere is less formal than at one time; although food still plays a major part at the Mariners, it is very much a pub these days.

FIRST WETHERED IN FARNHAM

Sevens Wine Bar & Bistro, in the Borough, Farnham now has draught beer available too, in the form of Wethered Bitter. I have always enjoyed eating at Sevens, but it will be more of a pleasure next time!

WOKING FALLS!

The Albion, opposite Woking station, believed to be the town's last fizz pub, has at last installed a handpump serving Charrington I.P.A. Rumours are that Bass is to follow shortly.

CHEQUERS CONFIRMED

The meeting provisionally arranged for Tuesday 24th May at the Chequers, Crookham, has now been confirmed.

ANNUAL CAMPA CAMPING WEEKEND - SPRING BANK HOLIDAY, MAY 27th to MAY 30th.

This year we shall sample the delights of the New Forest. Camping in the Forest is only allowed at the official Forestry Commission sites, which work out cheap for families, or a couple of people sharing a tent, but unfortunately a bit expensive for one person. The facilities, however, are good, and we have chosen Hollands Wood, Brockenhurst, as the site is just a short walk from the railway station and a number of good pubs (Whitbread, Eldridge Pope, Marston's and Wadworths beers are among those available). Further afield are numerous pubs to suit every taste; beers such as Gale's, Badger, Ringwood and the rare New Forest Brewery's product can be found in the area.

Between opening times there is the beautiful countryside to be explored, the coast is near at hand, and other attractions such as the National Motor Museum at Beaulieu, Bucklers Hard, Breamore Carriage and Countryside museums can be visited.

For those who want more than canvas over their heads, two Brockenhurst inns offer real ale and accomodation. they are: The Jugged Hare (tel.Lymington 23551) and the Rose & Crown (Lymington 22225).

The Forest camp sites are very popular at Bank Holidays, so it is essential to book early. To avoid any delay, it is advised to book direct:
